The Prophet Ezekiel and the Apostle John both had similar visions of four living creatures before the throne of God in Heaven. Ezekiel 1:10 and Revelation 4:7. These four different faces are like the four Gospels.

Purpose of Matthew

This book was probably written around _____AD. It was written particularly to the ______ people to show them that Jesus was the Messiah and the King they had been waiting for. The author does this by showing how Jesus' life and death fulfilled the many Old Testament prophecies. In His wisdom the Holy Spirit placed this book immediately after the Old Testament. All that the Old Testament had been pointing to is now seen in Jesus.

Although this book was written to the Jewish people in particular, it was written in the ______ language. About 300 years before the time of Christ the Greeks ruled the world. The Greek language became the international language and continued to be so, even during the time of Jesus and the early Church, when the Romans ruled the world.

This means that the New Testament could be understood, not only by the Jews, but by every race. The Good News was for everyone! Surely our God who is above human history had planned to use this for his purposes.

The name of the author is never mentioned in the book. However from earliest times Matthew has been known as the author. (Note that Matthew is also called Levi.)
